

Subordinating –

after, although, as, because,
before, if, since, when, where,
while

Linking Verbs

The four principal parts of sum are sum, *I am*, esse, *to be*, fui, *I have been* or *I was*, futurus, *about to be*.

Present Tense

sum	<i>I am</i>
es	<i>you are</i>
est	<i>he, she, it is</i> <i>there is</i>

su mus	<i>we are</i>
es tis,	<i>you are</i>
sunt,	<i>they are,</i>
	<i>there are</i>

Agreement of Verb and Subject

Both singular or both plural.

Complementary Infinitives

The “to” word is a verb that finishes
the thought.

We like to run.



Catullus, a Roman poet




